CONSENT DECREE

The complaint in this action was filed on November 30, 1982, by the Attorney General on behalf of the United States, to enforce the provisions of the Housing and Community Development Act of 1974, 42 U.S.C. §5301, et seq., and to enforce the regulations of the Department of Housing and Urban Development relating to non-discrimination in federally assisted programs and activities, 24 C.F.R. §570.601, et seq. The allegations of the complaint are that the Chicago Park District, its officers and Board of Commissioners, have pursued and continue to pursue policies and practices which discriminate against residents of black and Latino communities in the City of Chicago in the supply, distribution and maintenance of recreational services, programs and facilities by the Chicago Park District.

Plaintiff, United States, and defendants, Chicago Park District, et al., wish to resolve all the issues raised by the complaint in order to avoid the delay and expense of contested litigation. Accordingly, the parties have presented this Consent Decree to the Court for entry in full resolution of the matters raised in the complaint filed on behalf of the United States.

The parties, by agreeing to the entry of this Consent Decree, stipulate to the jurisdiction of the Court over this action and waive hearings and the entries of findings of fact and conclusions of law on all issues involved herein.

This Decree shall not constitute an admission of any violation of law by the defendants, Chicago Park District, et al., nor an adjudication by the Court on the merits of the allegations of the United States.

Accordingly, on the basis of the pleadings and all matters of record herein, and for good cause shown, this Consent Decree offered by the parties is accepted and, therefore,

It is hereby ORDERED, ADJUDGED and DECREED as follows:

A. GENERAL

1. The purpose of this Decree is to resolve all questions raised by the complaint filed in this action and thereby to achieve promptly (1) equal and nondiscriminatory treatment by the defendants in their assignment and allotment of person-

nel, programs, equipment, supplies and funds for recreational, instructional or athletic purposes or activities by the Chicago Park District among all community areas of the City of Chicago, (2) the establishment of systems, procedures, and schedules for normally scheduled and work order prompted maintenance, landscape and grounds-keeping which will assure that all parks, playgrounds and other acreage of the Chicago Park District receive equal attention, care and upkeep, and (3) that future capital funds for rehabilitation, renovation and new construction are allocated in accordance with schedules reflective of relative need as agreed to by the parties hereto.

2. The defendants, the Chicago Park District, et al., their agents, officers, officials, employees and successors in office, and all persons or organizations in active concert or participation with them be, and hereby are, permanently enjoined and restrained from discriminating on the basis of race or national origin in any aspect of the supply, distribution or maintenance of recreational, instructional, athletic or other services, activities and facilities provided by the defendants and specifically covered by the allegations contained in the complaint herein, and from failing or refusing to implement fully, or to participate and cooperate in the implementation of, the provisions set forth in this Decree.

B. COMPLIANCE AND DISPUTE RESOLUTION

3. The plaintiff, United States, and the defendants, Chicago Park District, et al., recognize that continuing cooperation as between them is necessary to assure the realization of the purpose and objectives of this Decree as set forth in paragraph 1 above. These parties further recognize the need within this Decree for flexibility to meet unanticipated events and contingencies, and for the conciliation of such disputes concerning compliance as may arise between them, without unnecessarily burdening the Court. Accordingly, the General Superintendent of the Chicago Park District shall designate the Assistant General Superintendent, Chief Engineer, Superintendent of Employment, General Attorney, and Comptroller for the Chicago Park District as members of an Implementation Committee. The General Superintendent, upon notice to the plaintiff, United States, may change the Chicago Park District officials designated as members of the Committee or reduce their number. The Committee shall meet once every three months and at such additional times as are necessary to the discharge of the duties and responsibilities assigned to it by this Decree. Whenever, in accordance with paragraphs 6 or 7 below, it is necessary to the resolution of any question or dispute concerning compliance by the defendants, Chicago Park District,

et al., with this Decree, the Committee and counsel for the United States shall meet upon the request of either.

4. The authority of the Board of Commissioners and the General Superintendent of the Chicago Park District remains undiminished. The responsibility of the Implementation Committee shall be to assure the proper implementation of this Decree. In the discharge of this responsibility, the Committee shall review the reports to be filed by the defendants pursuant to Section F of this Decree and take such action as necessary to correct any deficiencies in compliance with this Decree disclosed thereby. The Committee shall also review on a continuing basis the current and projected assignments of recreational personnel and distribution of programs pursuant to Section C of this Decree, the regular maintenance programs provided for by Section D, and the status of current and projected rehabilitation, new construction and other recreational capital improvement projects identified in Section E, as well as perform such other specific duties as assigned to the Committee by those Sections of this Decree. The Committee shall make on-site inspections at parks, playgrounds, playlots and any other locations relevant to the discharge of the Committee's duties and responsibilities under this Decree.

5. The existence of the Implementation Committee and its mailing address shall be made known to the citizens of the City

of Chicago by public notice displayed at all parks, playgrounds and playlots operated or maintained solely or jointly by the Chicago Park District. Citizens shall be advised by such notice that they may bring any concern or complaint they have concerning compliance by the defendants, Chicago Park District, et al., with this Decree to the attention of the Implementation Committee by letter addressed to the Committee. All such letters shall be placed before the Implementation Committee for response and, where investigation of the matter raised makes appropriate, corrective action. Complete records of the receipt and disposition of such letters shall be maintained in accordance with procedures to be established by the Committee.

6. Insofar as possible, the members of the Implementation Committee and counsel for the United States shall seek to resolve without resort to the Court any problems or disputes which may arise in the course of the implementation of this Decree. Any dispute or problem not resolved by that means may be brought before the Court for resolution upon a motion filed by either the plaintiff, United States, or the defendants, Chicago Park District, et al.

7. Should the plaintiff, United States, believe that in order to better effectuate the purpose of this Decree as set forth in paragraph 1 above, a modification or alteration, or an order of enforcement or clarification, of this Decree is

necessary, it may make application to this Court by motion for an appropriate order provided that agreement to such an order shall first be sought from the defendants, Chicago Park District, et al., through the Implementation Committee. Similarly, should the defendants, Chicago Park District, et al., believe that a change in circumstance justifies an alteration, either permanently or for a particular year, in the allocations of resources and/or personnel required by the Decree, or in the priorities, schedules and goals specified in the attachment hereto, and that such alteration can be made without defeating or substantially delaying the effectuation of the purpose and goals of this Decree as set forth in paragraph 1 above, they may make application to this Court by motion for such alteration provided that agreement to such alteration shall first be sought by the Implementation Committee from counsel for the plaintiff, United States.

C. RECREATION PERSONNEL AND PROGRAMS

8. An equitable allocation of Chicago Park District recreational personnel and programs shall be achieved over the next three calendar years beginning with the Spring-Summer programs for 1983. Attached hereto as Appendices A and B are listings of "parks of concern" (from among those identified as such by paragraph 31 below and listed in Appendix F) to which recreation personnel are assigned and where the previous

allocations of recreation personnel and programs have been below the average allocations made to other parks. The listings are arranged in accordance with the type of physical facilities in each such park of concern. Appendix A sets forth for each park the most recent allocations of recreation personnel for Fall-Winter programs by hours per week, and establishes for each of the next three years, beginning with the Fall-Winter programs initiated in the Fall of 1983, the additional recreation personnel hours per week to be added to the current base figure. Appendix B sets forth similar data and schedules of additional hours for Spring-Summer programs. For each park of concern listed in Appendices A and B, the annual goal shall be to maintain the current allocations of personnel hours per week and to progressively increase those hours at the rates indicated. For other parks of concern, the goal throughout the term of this Decree shall be to maintain the allocation of recreation personnel hours per week at levels no less than the current levels for each program period as reflected by Appendix C attached hereto.

9. So long as any recreation personnel allocation goals for parks of concern set forth in Appendices A and B are not met, the defendants, Chicago Park District, et al., shall immediately bring that situation to the attention of the Implementation Committee and counsel for the plaintiff, United

States, in order that a review may be made of existing and anticipated vacancies, and other budget considerations, within all operations of the Chicago Park District to determine whether mid-budget year transfers of funds should be made to meet the goals set forth in Appendices A and B.

10. Without further order of this Court, any of the additional recreation personnel hours per week scheduled at specific parks of concern listed in Appendices A and B, for any one year, may be decreased by 10%, provided that (1) the total additional hours for all parks of concern for the year in question is not decreased, and (2) the resulting greater number of additional hours allocated to any one other park of concern does not exceed 20%. To the extent that total recreation personnel allocation goals for parks of concern set forth in Appendices A and B are met for each of the three years for which goals are established, the defendants, Chicago Park District, et al., may add recreation personnel to other parks up to the total or final recreation personnel goal for parks of concern in the appropriate category. In no instance shall the recreation personnel hours so added to a park other than a park of concern during the 3-year period bring the total for that park above the final goal set forth in Appendices A and B for parks of concern in the appropriate category. Should the United States or the Implementation Committee determine that

other parks should be designated as "parks of concern" or listed in Appendices A and/or B for purposes of either additional recreation personnel hours or other remedial measures provided for by this Decree, it shall bring the matter to the attention of the other party for purposes of seeking appropriate modification to this Decree pursuant to the procedures set out in paragraphs 7 above and 44 below.

11. Within three years, in parks of concern, each Type A or B fieldhouse shall have assigned thereto a Park Supervisor, each Type C fieldhouse shall have assigned thereto a Playground Supervisor or Instructor-in-Charge, and each Type D fieldhouse shall have assigned thereto an Instructor-In-Charge after a six month probationary period is completed at each location. Such personnel, as well as their Recreation Area Supervisor, shall be selected and/or continued in such positions on the basis of their effectiveness in devising, promoting and directing recreation and instructional programs responsive to the needs and desires of the residents of the communities served by their facilities.

12. To assist Park and Playground Supervisors and Instructors-In-Charge (hereinafter Park Supervisors) in the development and implementation of recreation and instructional programs in parks of concern to which recreation personnel are

assigned, a highly qualified Recreation Expert shall be retained by the Chicago Park District after consultation with the Implementation Committee. The Recreation Expert, among other things, shall meet with each Park Supervisor and his or her Recreation Area Supervisor to devise effective methods for obtaining the views and recommendations of local community groups and interested citizens concerning recreation and instructional programs appropriate for the park of concern serving their community. The Recreation Expert shall also participate, to the extent possible, in obtaining the community views and recommendations through the methods adopted. The Recreation Expert shall review the appropriateness, practicality and feasibility of all programs proposed by Park Supervisors and Recreation Area Supervisors, and report thereon to the Implementation Committee.

13. The additional employees needed to implement the schedules of increased recreation personnel hours shall be recruited and selected for their qualifications and training to conduct the recreation or instructional programs to which they are assigned. Such personnel, as well as existing personnel, assigned to parks of concern shall receive the equipment and materials necessary to conduct their programs. The defendants, Chicago Park District, et al., shall continue to implement the

current Recreation Equipment and Material Supply System (hereinafter Equipment and Supply System), subject to the further requirements of this Decree. This Equipment and Supply System shall allow each Park Supervisor, Playground Supervisor, or Instructor-In-Charge to request and obtain, by written forms and acknowledgments, the equipment and materials necessary for the recreation personnel under his or her supervision to conduct effectively the programs for which he or she is responsible. In those instances where the requested materials or equipment would normally come from the Park District's Operating Fund, such requests shall be acted upon consistent with the procedures described in paragraph 34 below. In those instances where the requested materials or equipment would normally come from the Park District's Category W Capital Improvement Fund identified in paragraphs 22 and 23 below, the General Superintendent or his designee shall consider the feasibility of the request in allocating Category W Capital Improvement Funds. *For example?*

14. To assure equality and nondiscrimination in the quality of the recreation and instructional programs, and other facilities and services offered throughout all community areas of the City of Chicago by the Chicago Park District, an effective employee performance evaluation system applicable to Chicago Park District employees shall be fully implemented by

the defendants, Chicago Park District, et al., consistent with applicable Illinois civil service statutes.

15. Whenever more than three months after the initiation of a program in a park of concern in which the anticipated enrollment should be in excess of 10 persons, the actual enrollment in that program does not exceed 10 persons, an evaluation of the causes of that low attendance shall be made by the defendants. Such evaluation shall include a review of the effectiveness of the appropriate recreation personnel at all levels responsible for the program. Where deficiencies in personnel performances are found, corrective action shall be taken. Similarly, where other, non-personnel causes within the control of the defendants, Chicago Park District, et al., are found to account in whole or in part for the lack of sustained enrollment, corrective action addressing those causes shall also be taken. Where corrective action taken pursuant to this paragraph or, in the cases of causes outside of the control of the defendants, Chicago Park District, et al., taken pursuant to paragraph 16 below, fail to increase the enrollment level of the program in question, the program may be consolidated with a similar program at a nearby park.

16. Should an evaluation of a program or programs in a park of concern where enrollments have not exceeded 10 persons disclose a cause to be one outside of the control of the

defendants, Chicago Park District, et al., but within the jurisdiction of an agency or department of the City of Chicago, the defendants shall take all appropriate actions to obtain the cooperation of that City agency or department in effecting corrective action. Where "gang activity," or criminal conduct of any nature, interferes with the use of a park or its programs, the cooperation of local police commanders and, if necessary, Police Department officials at higher levels shall be sought to increase police patrols of the park area and take such other action as necessary and appropriate. Involvement of community residents shall be actively solicited to devise methods and programs for dealing with community problems which threaten the effectiveness of recreation or instructional programs undertaken pursuant to or consistent with this Decree.

17. If additional funds become available for the hiring or assignment of Category 40 recreation personnel above and beyond the increases needed to assure compliance with the goals for parks of concern in any one of the three calendar years established by paragraph 8 above, such additional personnel shall be assigned to parks on an equitable basis.

D. REGULAR MAINTENANCE

18. The Revised Work Order System, devised in 1981 and implemented throughout the Chicago Park District in 1982, shall continue to be used to systematically respond in an appropriate

priority manner to building, landscape and equipment repair and maintenance needs in all parks, playgrounds and playlots, consistent with the following requirements:

- a) The system shall be applicable to all emergency and non-emergency work order requests for services from the following Service Divisions of the Department of Engineering where such requests are initiated by Park Supervisors and/or Recreation Area Supervisors:

Mechanical

Repair and Construction

Landscape Maintenance

- (b) Work order requests classified under the Revised Work Order System as being of an "emergency" nature shall continue to be accorded top priority and responded to immediately.
- (c) No park, playground or playlot shall be neglected in its building and equipment repair and maintenance needs. Each of the Recreation Area Supervisors assigned to the ten Chicago Park District Recreation Areas shall be responsible for assuring the initiation of necessary emergency and non-emergency work

order requests for all acreage within his or her Area which is subject to the Revised Work Order System. At least once a month, during the week preceding the system's monthly work order review meeting, the Recreation Area Supervisor shall have all such acreage inspected and work orders therefor executed or, if no repair or other maintenance work is needed, a report form executed indicating that that fact has been determined after a physical inspection of the site.

Until the Capacity and responsiveness

(d) Until the capacity and responsiveness of the system is expanded, the number of outstanding non-emergency work order requests per site per month shall be limited to five. It shall be the goal of the system during the first 18 months of its application to a site that no non-emergency work order shall remain unexecuted and the repairs not made at that site more than 180 days following the date of the first work order review meeting at which it was listed. On the basis of the first 18 months of experience, or such longer period of time as the Implementation Committee agrees is appropriate for the purpose, the Implementation Committee may recommend shorter time

periods to the defendants, Chicago Park District, et al.

- (e) Systematic maintenance or repair work of an annual or more frequent nature, such as the annual Spring painting and rigging repair of playground equipment, shall be scheduled consistent with the goals set in accordance with sub-paragraph (c) above, provided that for periods not exceeding two months, a freeze on the acceptance of new work order requests may be imposed with regard to the services of a specific class of personnel where an annual systematic maintenance and repair program, or a major back-log of emergency and/or non-emergency work order requests, dictates.

19. Regular scheduled landscape maintenance shall be conducted at all parks, playgrounds and playlots in accordance with the schedules of services attached hereto as Appendix D. Compliance with such schedules shall be consistent with the following:

- (a) No park, playground or playlot shall be neglected in its landscape maintenance and clean-up needs. It shall be the responsibility of the Park Supervisor or, with acreage to which no resident Park Supervisor is assigned, the Recreation Area Supervisor in whose

area the site is located, to determine that the schedules of regular landscape maintenance are being met. Where it is determined by such personnel that any schedule is not being met or that, despite being met, the usage of the site or surrounding areas is such that more frequent landscape maintenance and/or clean-up is necessary, such shall be reported at the monthly work order review meeting to the appropriate General Foreman of Landscape Maintenance and in writing to the Chief Engineer and the Director of Landscape Maintenance.

- (b) It shall be the goals of the program of regularly scheduled landscape maintenance to assure that every park, playground and playlot is kept clean, safe and well-maintained. Special concern shall be given to the pickup of litter and trash, the removal of broken glass and, during the growing seasons, the cutting and trimming of grass, hedges and other vegetation.

20. Building and Facilities Operations Division personnel, in addition to their custodial, janitorial and other designated duties at the buildings to which they are assigned, shall on a daily basis police the grounds within 100 yards of their buildings and remove all litter and trash, police the play-apparatus areas to remove trash and broken glass, and

conduct such other clean-up activities in the park where their building is located as directed by the Park Supervisor and/or Recreation Area Supervisor responsible for the acreage.

E. CAPITAL IMPROVEMENTS

21. During the term of this Decree, the defendants, Chicago Park District, et al., shall commit and expend funds from the Chicago Park District Capital Improvement General Obligation Bond Fund (hereinafter, Capital Improvement Fund) only in accordance with the provisions of this decree.

22. The following categories of rehabilitation, new construction and other recreational capital improvement needs have been determined to exist within the Chicago Park District:

- A. Fieldhouse Rehabilitation - General rehabilitation work at existing fieldhouses to render them aesthetically acceptable, functionally sound, and in conformance with building and safety code requirements.
- B. Fieldhouse Replacements - Replacement of functionally obsolete fieldhouses with contemporary, more manageable, gym-equipped, energy efficient structures.
- C. Fieldhouse Additions - Additions of gyms and appurtenant dressing facilities.
- D. Swimming Pool Rehabilitations - Seal joints and paint certain existing pools; provide liners and other work necessary to render other pools more leak-free and to increase sanitary and safety attributes.
- E. New Pool Construction - Provide new regulation size swimming pools at specific locations.
- F. Playground Rehabilitations - Repair or replace worn out and obsolete equipment, and provide landscaping

and other miscellaneous site improvements as necessary.

- G. New Playground Construction - Provide new playgrounds at selected locations where existing playgrounds are obsolete or where new site development is required.
- H. Athletic Field Rehabilitations - Provide fill and general resurfacing and other improvements at heavily used athletic field locations.
- I. New Athletic Field Construction - Provide well graded athletic fields with proper drainage structures at selected locations where no athletic fields now exist.
- J. Natatorium - Provide indoor swimming pools with locker and shower facilities at selected locations.
- K. Small Park Building Rehabilitations - General rehabilitation or new construction of non-fieldhouse structures such as recreation buildings, comfort stations and similar miscellaneous facilities.
- L. Paving Improvements - Repair or replace deteriorated walks, parking areas and pavements.
- M. Lighting Improvements - Provide security and efficient illumination at various park locations.
- N. Baseball Diamonds - Provide fill to insure proper playing surfaces, and install new backstops, player-benches and supplementary facilities.
- O. Landscape Improvements and Rehabilitations - Rehabilitate worn landscaped areas, replace and provide new trees, and restore landscaping at construction sites.
- P. Harbor Improvements - Replace worn out and damaged boat docks and mooring facilities, including associated utilities, provide or repair shore protection and dredge selected areas as needed.
- Q. Sewer and Water Systems - Repair, replace and provide for new sewer and water lines.

- R. Non-Building Structures - Repair and rehabilitate park-related bridges, decorative features, viaducts and service-related facilities.
- S. Equipment and Machinery Replacement - Annual purchase of maintenance equipment and machinery required for Chicago Park District operations, including the replacement of items that can no longer be economically repaired.
- T. Regional Parks and Special Projects - Improvements and work necessary at regional parks such as Lincoln Park and Zoo, South Shore Country Club Park, Warren Park, etc., special construction of stadium roof, any related work for the 1992 World's Fair, and other special acquisitions, developments and construction.
- U. Unscheduled Emergency Work - Repair and restoration needs caused by disasters such as fires, aggravated vandalism, storm damage, structural failures, roof leaks, etc., that cannot be foreseen but which for public health or safety reasons must be performed immediately.
- V. Chicago Park District Service Facilities - Repairs or renovations to Chicago Park District Service Yards, Service Buildings, and Service Rooms at various locations.
- W. Recreational Equipment and Furniture - Replacement or initial purchase of major recreational and gymnastic equipment and furniture for fieldhouses and other recreational facilities.
- X. Repair and Construction Materials - Purchase and supply of building, mechanical and electrical materials and supplies for normal maintenance and replacement where items cannot be obtained with operating funds.

23. During Fiscal Year 1983 (April 1, 1983 to March 31, 1984) and each of the following five fiscal years, a minimum of \$10,000,000 annually shall be made available from the Capital Improvement Fund to meet the existing rehabilitation, new

construction and other recreational capital improvement needs in the categories identified in paragraph 22 above. This minimum annual funding shall be expended solely upon actual construction (e.g., bricks and mortar), exclusive of any architectural, engineering or other design and inspection costs. Subject to such adjustments as allowed or required by paragraphs 24 through 30 below, this minimum annual funding, and any additional funding for actual construction in excess of \$10,000,000 made available from the Capital Improvement Fund, shall be allocated between the categories in accordance with the following schedules for varying-funding levels:

24. Upon the completion of all rehabilitation, new construction or other recreational capital improvement projects within any one of the identified categories, or upon the final commitment of funding for such projects, the then remaining and future allocations of funds for that category shall be redistributed among the remaining categories on a basis which shall maintain the proportional ratio of funding levels as between those remaining categories.

25. Without further order of this Court, any of the percentages set forth in paragraph 23 above, or as adjusted in accordance with paragraph 24 above, may be increased or decreased in any one fiscal year by 10% (e.g., 10% of 23% is 2.3% allowing a range for the category involved of 20.7% to 25.3%). In addition, Category U (Unscheduled Emergency Work) shall have precedent over all other categories should the amount allocated for Category U prove insufficient. However, (1) should at any point in a fiscal year the amount of funds remaining uncommitted in Category U drop to \$100,000 or less, the Implementation Committee shall be notified and given an accounting to date of the expenditures and commitments made of Category U

funds, and (2) should needs in Category U during any fiscal year not exhaust the amount allocated for that purpose, such uncommitted funds as remain in excess of \$100,000 as of the close of the third quarter, may be expended in any other category listed in paragraph 23 above without regard to any priority scheduled attached hereto or may be reallocated for matching fund purposes in accordance with paragraph 29 below, without further approval of this Court.

26. Attached hereto as Appendix E are priority schedules of parks for categories A, B, C, E, F and H. As Capital Improvement Funds are made available for expenditure in each of these categories in accordance with the allocations provided for in paragraph 23 above, the letting of contracts shall be in the order in which the parks are listed in each schedule. Without further order of this Court, no deviation from any of the attached schedules shall occur with respect to the funds allocated to the category involved other than (1) in any one fiscal year the order in which contracts are let may vary provided all such contracts for which funds are available for that fiscal year are let during that fiscal year and all resulting work commences within nine months of the close of that fiscal year, and (2) if projects in at least three parks are to be undertaken in a fiscal year, the project for any one

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park may be skipped to reach the project for the next additional park on the schedule, provided the project skipped shall be reached within the following fiscal year. The defendants, Chicago Park District, et al., shall not be held responsible for a failure to comply with any priority schedule where the failure is due to strikes, acts of God, impossibility of performance, or other matters over which they have no control.

27. CPD Capital Improvement Funds allocated during any one fiscal year to category T (Regional Parks and Special Projects) may be expended in any other category listed in paragraph 23 above without regard to any priority schedule attached hereto.

28. Proposed expenditures to be made in categories G, I and J shall be reviewed and approved by the Implementation Committee as being consistent with the purposes of this Decree as set forth in paragraph 1, above at least 3 months in advance of the calendar year in which such expenditures will be made, beginning with Fiscal Year 1984 (April 1, 1984). Such proposal shall identify the nature and amount of each expenditure and the park or other facility affected.

29. Where, in order to complete a project started with federal funds under the Urban Park and Recreation Recovery (UPARR) and Community Development (CD) programs, moneys from the Capital Improvement Fund must be used because of the lack

of availability of continuing federal funds, such amounts shall not be included as part of or subject to the allocations required by paragraph 23 above. Any future federal, state or local funds which may be made available to the Chicago Park District shall be expended in accordance with such priority and allotment schedules or other requirements and restrictions as may be established by the granting agency or entity. Where Chicago Park District matching funds are necessary as a condition to the receipt of any grant or gift of capital improvement funds, and the expenditures are not to be made in accordance with the allocations of paragraph 23 above, and the priority schedules attached hereto, such matching funds shall be taken only from such uncommitted funds as are in categories T and U. If uncommitted funds in categories T and U are insufficient to satisfy a matching funds obligation of the Chicago Park District, after consultation with the Implementation Committee, Capital Improvement Funds not previously budgeted for the fiscal year involved may be expended or committed if to do so will not jeopardize or frustrate the present or future implementation of any provision of this Decree. Any capital improvement funds obtained from federal, state or local sources which do not have to be expended in accordance with priority and allotment schedules or other incumbrances or restrictions established by the granting agency or entity, shall be expended

in accordance with and in addition to the allocations specified in paragraph 23 above and the priority schedules attached hereto.

30. Such future capital improvement funds as the Chicago Park District may obtain from the Chicago Public Building Commission (CPBC) may be expended without regard to the allocations specified in paragraph 23 above and the priority schedules attached hereto provided that (1) the annual amount to be expended or committed from the Capital Improvement Fund in accordance with those allocations and schedule is, as required by paragraph 23 above, at least \$10,000,000 in the fiscal year such CPBC funds are obtained, and (2) the future annual capital improvement general obligation bonding capacity of the Chicago Park District is not reduced below \$10,000,000 as a result of obtaining CPBC funds. That is, the defendants, Chicago Park District, et al., may obtain and expend CPBC funds outside of such allocations and schedules as long as present and projected future expenditures and/or commitments of funds to be made in accordance with those allocations specified in paragraph 23 above and the schedules attached hereto are at least \$10,000,000 annually, drawn from the Capital Improvement Fund.

F. RECORDS AND REPORTS

31. Attached hereto as Appendix F is a list of all parks, playgrounds, playlots and other acreage operated and maintained by the Chicago Park District. Indicated by single asterisks on Appendix F are those parks, playgrounds and playlots of special concern under this Decree (herein, parks of concern). Indicated by two asterisks are those parks of concern to which recreation personnel are assigned.

32. All records required to be maintained by this Decree shall be open to inspection by counsel for the United States upon reasonable request during normal business hours, and all reports required by this Decree shall be served on counsel for the United States. In addition, notice of meetings of the Implementation Committee shall be given to counsel for the United States by telephone at least seven days in advance of each meeting. Following the close of each fiscal year, the Implementation Committee shall file an annual report with the Court setting forth summaries of the actions taken during the fiscal year in compliance with this Decree.

33. At least 14 days prior to a regularly scheduled meeting of the Implementation Committee, and at least 60 days prior to the beginning of each year's Spring-Summer and Fall-Winter recreation programs, the defendants shall compile and serve copies of a report by parks (listing parks of concern

separately), setting forth the Category 40 personnel to be assigned for the forthcoming seasonal programs, the job title of each, the hours per week each is to work, and the programs for which each will be responsible. Any failures to meet the scheduled increases in recreation personnel hours in any of the parks of concern set forth in Appendices A or B, and any increase or decrease in recreation personnel hours in other parks over the previous year's hours shall be fully explained, as shall any adjustments in scheduled hours made pursuant to paragraphs 10 or 17 above.

34. Full and complete records shall be maintained concerning the operations of the Recreation Equipment and Material Supply System referred to in paragraph 13 above. By the 30th day following the close of each calendar quarter, a report shall be compiled from those records setting forth for every park to which Category 40 personnel are assigned (listing parks of concern separately) each request made for recreational equipment or materials, the nature of the equipment or materials sought, estimated or actual cost, the dates the requests were (1) initiated by the Park Supervisor, Playground Supervisor or Instructor-In-Charge, (2) approved by the Recreation Area Supervisor, (3) approved by the Recreational Department, and (4) delivered to the park. Where a request is disapproved at any step, the reasons for such disapproval shall be fully

stated. Where a reason for a disapproval is a current unavailability of Bond Funds, the report shall indicate the feasibility of making such funds available from moneys allocated for other capital improvements pursuant to paragraph 23 above.

35. Full and complete records shall be maintained of all actions taken by the defendants, Chicago Park District, et al., to assure equality and nondiscrimination in the quality and effectiveness of recreation and other personnel assigned to parks consistent with paragraph 14 above.

36. Full and complete records shall be maintained for all recreation and instructional programs undertaken in parks of concern reflecting the basis for adoption of the program (including alternatives considered), the date of the adoption, the efforts undertaken to recruit participants, and subsequent weekly attendance. By the 30th day following the close of each calendar quarter, a report shall be compiled covering every program in a park of concern where the enrollment of participants should be substantially in excess of 10 persons but where the actual enrollment is less than that number. The report shall set forth the conclusion reached following the evaluation required by paragraph 15 above as to the cause or causes of the low enrollment in each such program. Where one or more causes involve personnel effectiveness or non-personnel deficiencies

within the control of the defendants, Chicago Park District, et al., the corrective actions and the results thereof shall be set forth in detail. Similarly, where a cause or causes is determined to be beyond the direct control of the defendants, the efforts taken by the defendants to obtain corrective actions from other governmental agencies or officials, or from private organizations or citizens, and the results of those efforts shall be set forth in detail.

37. Full and complete records shall be maintained concerning the operation of the Revised Work Order System. Among other things, these records shall be kept by park, playground and playlot and shall include all work orders submitted for each, the dates of those submissions, the dates the repairs requested were made or otherwise disposed of, and the costs of materials and labor. Work orders classified as "emergency" shall be kept separately from those classified as "non-emergency".

38. By the 30th day following the close of the second and fourth calendar quarter, a report shall be compiled from the records maintained in accordance with paragraph 37 above, which report shall reflect the following:

- (a) An overall assessment of the effectiveness of the operation of the Revised Work Order System during the last two quarters, including the numbers of emergency

work orders and non-emergency work orders received, processed and completed, and their value. Any inefficiencies or other problems with the system shall be fully described and discussed, and corrective actions identified.

- (b) Any park of concern for which no non-emergency work order was submitted at two or more of the monthly work order review meetings shall be identified, with an indication of whether or not written reports were filed as required by paragraph 18 (c) above confirming that no repair or maintenance needs were found at the site after the monthly physical inspections thereof.
- (c) All parks, playgrounds and playlots, and the non-emergency work orders involved, shall be identified whenever during the last two quarters there is a failure to meet the goals of the Revised Work Order System identified in paragraph 18 (d) above, of having no work order remain outstanding more than 180 days (or for such shorter period of time as set by the Chicago Park District) from its first submission at a monthly work order review meeting. For each work order so listed, the following information shall

be provided separately for parks of concern and other parks, playgrounds and playlots:

Park, playground or playlot involved,
Nature and estimated cost of repair requested,
Date work order submitted,
Reason(s) goal was not met,
Steps taken to assure repair requested is made,
Date repair made or estimated date will be made.

39. Full and complete records shall be maintained concerning the operation of the regular scheduled landscape maintenance conducted at all parks, playgrounds and playlots in accordance with the schedules attached hereto as Appendix D. Such records shall be kept separately by site and shall specifically include all reports or determinations made by Park Supervisors and/or Recreation Area Supervisors pursuant to paragraph 19(a) above that any schedule is not being met or that, despite being met, the usage of the site or surrounding areas is such that more frequent landscape maintenance or clean up is necessary. The responses to such reports and/or determinations shall also be made part of the records maintained pursuant to this paragraph.

40. By the 30th day following the close of the second and fourth calendar quarters, a report shall be compiled from the records maintained in accordance with paragraph 39 above,

identifying all parks of concern for which a report or determination of the failure or inadequacy of the regular scheduled landscape maintenance program has been made by a Park Supervisor and/or Recreation Area Supervisor. Such semi-annual report shall set forth the corrective action taken concerning the deficiency reported and whether any other earlier reports of deficiency concerning that site, and the actions taken on the earlier reports, have occurred in the preceding 12 months.

41. At least 45 days prior to the adoption of the proposed annual Capital Improvement Budget of the Chicago Park District, that proposed budget, the schedules of capital improvements anticipated to be made, and the specifications of those improvements, shall be presented to the Implementation Committee for its review and any recommended adjustments thereto found necessary to bring the proposed budget and schedules of proposed improvements into compliance with the requirements of Section E of this Decree. To facilitate compliance with this paragraph, the defendants, Chicago Park District, et al., shall provide any information or reports which may be requested.

42. Full and complete records shall be maintained of all funds expended from the Capital Improvement Fund. With regard to those Capital Improvement Fund expenditures made pursuant to Section E of this Decree, the records shall include detailed

reports of all construction and other work site inspections made pursuant to a work inspection system to be adopted and refined by the defendants, Chicago Park District, et al., and reviewed for adequacy by the Implementation Committee. That work inspection system shall include appropriate procedures for (1) final on-site architectural and engineering reviews of work to be performed before the bidding or work order procedures are invoked to assure completeness of work specifications, (2) on-going, on-site inspection of work in progress to assure quality compliance with work specifications, and (3) final on-site architectural and engineering inspections and reviews of work completed.

43. By the 120th day following the close of each fiscal year, a report shall be compiled from the records maintained in accordance with paragraph 42 above. This report shall identify, by category as set forth in paragraph 23 above, all funds expended or otherwise committed from the Capital Improvement Fund during the fiscal year, the park and project of each expenditure, the date on which work on the project commenced, the date the project was completed or is expected to be completed, the amount expended or expected to be expended on the project, and a summary of the results of all inspections made pursuant to the work inspection system, which summary shall specifically identify all deficiencies found and correction actions taken.

G. RETAINED JURISDICTION

44. The Court shall retain jurisdiction of this cause for the purpose of issuing any additional order or decrees needed to effectuate the purpose and objectives of this Decree as set forth in paragraph 1 above or to enforce or clarify its implementation. Where an application or motion for modification, alteration or amendment to this Decree, or for an order of enforcement or clarification, indicates by signature of counsel that it is unopposed by either the plaintiff, United States, or the defendants, Chicago Park District, et al., the application or motion may be presented to the Court without hearing and the proposed order may be immediately implemented subject to subsequent approval of the Court.

45. At any time six years following the entry of this Decree, the plaintiff, United States, or the defendants, Chicago Park District, et al., upon a showing of compliance consistent with the purpose and objectives of this Decree as set forth in paragraph 1 above, may move for the dissolution of this Decree and the dismissal of this action.
