



Villalobos is an Assistant Professor at IIT, Chicago. She holds a Master's in Design Studies from Harvard Graduate School of Design, and a Ph.D. in Landscape Architecture from the École Nationale Supérieure de Paysage-Versailles. In 2017, she won first prize in the Venezuelan Architecture Biennale, and it was the first time a woman received this award. Villalobos serves on the Lincoln Yards Advisory Council, the Committee on Design for the Department of City Planning in Chicago, and as a core member of Dark Matter University. Villalobos is the recipient of the Council of Educators in Landscape Architecture 2022 Excellence in Design Studio Teaching Award.






